

FIMC-VI Mission

To promote the success of Florida's students with visual impairments by:

FIMC-VI Information

- Statewide resource center for K-12 students who are visually impaired and enrolled in a public school, private school, or students being homeschooled. FIMC-VI is located in the Hillsborough County Public School District.
- FIMC-VI is a discretionary project maintained by the Florida Department of Education, Bureau of Exceptional Education and Student Services (BEESS).



The Print/Braille Early Literacy Program from the Beginning



- The program began in 2013.
- The goal was to get braille into the hands of as many emergent braille readers as possible.
- Produced by a small group of dedicated volunteers.

- A non-profit association with members from all over the state and country.
- The purpose of VAVF is to provide education, mentorship, and training to our members who produce reading and instructional materials in a tactile format for persons in Florida who are blind or visually impaired.
- These amazing volunteers make this program possible!



What is it?


- A program that provides free print/braille books (i.e. "twinvision" books) to teachers of students with visual impairments in public and private schools.
- These print/braille books allow emerging braille readers to have access to a variety of accessible, current, and ageappropriate reading materials at home and in schools.
- The print on the page can be read by family members, teachers, and paraprofessionals while the child follows along with the braille. This type of shared reading experience is important for fostering literacy skills in students who read braille.





How Does the Program Work?

 Teachers of students with visual impairments in the state of Florida can order 10 free print/braille books per month.



- This program runs all 12 months of the year.
- Books are purchased using FIMC-VIs IDEA funds.
- Available in contracted or uncontracted Unified English Braille (UEB).
- Books are for the students and teachers to keep so they can be read over and over again.
- Provides students with a visual impairment the same opportunity and access to emergent reading books.
- They can be used in classroom libraries, school libraries and homes.

Florida's District Book Vetting Process

<u>Title 48 C.F.R. § 300.101 - 1006.40 - Purchase of instructional materials</u>

- Each district school board is responsible for the content of all materials used in a classroom or otherwise made available to students. Each district school board shall adopt rules, and each district school superintendent shall implement procedures, that:
 - (a) Maximize student use of the district-approved instructional materials.
 - (b) Provide a process for public review of, public comment on, and the adoption of materials, including those used to provide instruction.

Print/Braille Early Literacy Program in Action

- Real-world or real-classroom applications from fellow teachers:
 - Used the book for braille instruction and practice at school. Once the student was proficient, the book was sent home to keep and read to their family as often as they like.
 - Ordered multiple copies of one book and used them with sighted peers in reading groups.
 - Created book clubs within a school so students could converse about common favorites.
 - Ordered specific shape or counting books to teach braille along with basic concepts in a fun way.

Additional Ideas

 Use all-time favorites to enhance daily living skills lessons for preschool students – Pete the Cat and His Four Groovy Buttons.

 Sort buttons by shape, size and/or color. Use a button board or a shirt to practice dressing and buttoning


skills.

 Gather real objects found in the books to create book-boxes for a more meaningful experience.




Florida Virgin Island Deafblind Project (FAVI) and the Print/Braille Early Literacy Program

- Created a "Book Buddies" program for students that are deaf-blind using the print/braille books
- Match the books with other types of media and resources:
 - American Sign Language (ASL)
 - Described and Captioned Media Program
 - Narrated video/audio versions of each story
- Provide objects and craft activities to help families engage in shared reading at home






FIMC-VI Print/Braille Early Literacy Program Survey





Participation in Years






Program Overall Ratings






Student Access to Braille






Braille Reading Abilities






